




Examples of inherent social and biodiversity benefits of REDD+:

Socio-economic functions: Forest products and services are critical to the livelihoods of Indigenous and Maroon peoples throughout Suriname, such as subsistence hunting, boat making, medicinal plant usage, agricultural usage, housing construction and cultural activities. Monitoring related to socio-economic functions will need to cover compliance with agreed safeguards as well as with relevant international commitments.

**Productive functions**: According to various analyses, Suriname's forest sector appears to have operated well below sustainable levels of timber production in recent decades. This trend has recently shifted in the direction of higher levels of production. Given Suriname's relatively low current level of socio-economic development, as well as high poverty levels amongst Indigenous and Maroon peoples, it is important that forest resources can continue to contribute to achievement of the country's socio-economic development goals. Trends in this area will therefore bear careful monitoring.

**Governance**: An important potential co-benefit of REDD+ involves its possible contribution to various areas of forest and land use governance. These include a range of issues related to SFM, land use rights, land use planning, etc. It also involves governance of the Readiness process itself. Monitoring of these aspects represents a key component of the R-PP.

## 5. Main Lessons Learned

As this is a semi-annual report, it is expected that this section will be fairly substantial, making reference to different lessons learning documents, and/or events developed and dealing with issues of particular interest with respect to readiness of carbon funding under REDD+.

The Suriname REDD+ programme has made important progress towards establishing national management arrangements in particular, in the aspects of thePMU.; REDD+ assistants constituted of IP and marroon representatives and the Major Group Collective, including representatives from NGOs, communities, the private sector and academia, and provide technical advice to the PMU in the project intial phase.
This means that Suriname already has in place a set of institutions to help facilitate REDD+ readiness activities.
There are a number of areas; however, where efforts are still needed to be fully ready for REDD+ implementation.
First, it is important to establish a robust and reliable national forest monitoring system to be able to report on emission reduction to the international community and thereby access international funding commensurate to the performance achieved in reducing emission.
Second, policy measures to tackle deforestation and forest degradation need to be fully developed and implemented to increase the forest carbon stock and maximize the opportunities for international funding. This work requires careful analysis of both the direct and indirect causes of deforestation.
Third, it is essential to develop a national safeguard system to ensure REDD+ policy measures do not result in adverse social or environmental consequences and at the same time to ensure that REDD+ benefits biodiversity conservation, provision of ecosystem services and poverty reduction. Closely related to the safeguard approach, is the importance of establishing a grievance mechanism. The REDD+ grievance mechanism will be set up at the national level, first as a preventive measure to monitor the risk of conflict; and second as a conflict resolution mechanism should conflict arise.
